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

Market Access

The Northern Waterfront is a key component of the vibrant Bay Area economy. With a strong multimodal shipping infrastructure, the Northern Waterfront has access to both international and domestic markets. (1)

Bay Area Economic Landscape

With a Gross Regional Product (GRP) of \$535 billion, the Bay Area would be the 19th largest economy in the world. (1) The Bay Area's GRP falls between the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) of Switzerland and Sweden. (3) The Bay Area is a top global innovation center and boasts the highest concentration of innovation-related jobs in the United States. Additionally, the Bay Area has the highest economic productivity in the nation - nearly twice the national average. (1)

Economic Landscape of the Northern Waterfront

The Northern Waterfront generates \$21.6 billion in annual economic output and is home to an estimated 60% of the industrial designated land in Contra Costa County. There are more than 26,000 jobs tied to the Northern Waterfront and approximately one third of those jobs are in the Manufacturing Sector. Manufacturing jobs generally provide an average wage above the County's median household income. (1)



Bay Area Trade

In 2011, 436 million tons of cargo passed through the Bay Area. Cargo tonnage is expected to reach 733 million tons by 2035. The value of trade in the Bay Area is estimated at \$628 billion and is expected to increase to over \$1.5 trillion. 

Importance of Intermodal Freight Transportation

Manufacturing and shippers rely on "just in time" deliveries of raw materials and finished goods to reduce inventory costs. This has resulted in the practice of intermodal freight transportation and larger centralized terminals. (1) Intermodal freight transportation uses containers on multiple modes
